In 1942 sixteen-year-old Chaya Lindner is a Jewish girl living in Nazi-occupied Poland and a courier who smuggles food and documents to the isolated Jewish ghettos in southern Poland. She depends on her forged papers and "Aryan" features to keep her safe—but when a mission goes wrong and many of her colleagues are arrested, she finds herself on a journey to Warsaw where an uprising is in the works. 385 pages

In Warsaw, Poland, in 1942, Mira faces impossible decisions after learning that the Warsaw ghetto is to be liquidated, but a group of young people are planning an uprising against their Nazi captors. 404 pages

For twins Chaim and Gittel, life in the ghetto and then the concentration camp feels like a fairy tale with evil witches and dangerous ovens looming on the horizon. They find light through Chaim's poetry and the love they have for each other. As the brother and sister lose everything but each other, Chaim's words become a beacon of memory so that the children and grandchildren of survivors will never forget the atrocities that happened during the Holocaust. 417 pages

The Little Liar

by Mitch Albom

Eleven-year-old Nico Crispi never told a lie. When the Nazi's invade his home in Salonika, Greece, the trustworthy boy is discovered by a German officer, who offers him a chance to save his family. All Nico has to do is convince his fellow Jewish residents to board trains heading towards "the east" where they are promised jobs and safety. Only after it is too late, does Nico discover that he helped send the people he loved--and all the others--to their doom at Auschwitz. 352 pages

To the Edge of Sorrow

by Ahoron Apelfeld

Seventeen-year-old Edmund is a member of a resistance group comprising four dozen fighters. After escaping from a nearby ghetto and while battling numbing cold, hunger, and German soldiers, they are determined to sabotage the German war effort and rescue as many Jews as they can from the trains taking them to concentration camps. 291 pages

Kristoff, a young apprentice stamp engraver, and Elena, the master engraver's daughter, join forces with the Austrian resistance to send underground messages and forge papers. In 1989, Katie Nelson comes across her father's stamp collection that sends her and her appraiser on a journey to uncover a story of passion and tragedy behind the Berlin Wall. 322 pages

Esther Safran Foer grew up in a family where history was too terrible to speak of. The child of parents who were each the sole survivors of their respective families, for Esther the Holocaust was always felt but never discussed. 
